Content Vocabulary

Closed Syllable: the vowel is followed by a consonant.

Open Syllable: nothing comes after the vowel.

Vowel Consonant E Syllable: first vowel is usually long, and the e is silent.

R-Controlled Syllable: if the vowel is followed by r, the vowel does not make its expected sound.

Digraph: a combination of two letters representing one sound

High Frequency Word: those words which occur most frequently in written material and are usually "rule breakers."
